IB Visual Arts Exhibition (SL)

Rationale

My selected works seek to freeze the transience of the world to capture a dream or imagination for people to consider and relate to. Thus, the purpose of my exhibition relates to the medium of photography in its ability to preserve life for human interaction.

As a photographer, I document my surroundings, but not in a matter-of-fact way. From the experiences of my travels (such as Las Vegas) and school life, I see scenes of friends, family, and even complete unfamiliarity that become the basis of my imagination. In my mind, I then augment the scene with color, light, and memories. Movies such as Christopher Nolan's *Inception* add evocations of place that I manifest in my own works.

The exhibition encourages people of the audience to apply their own lives into the photo. Several of the photos place the camera (and thus the observer) directly in the action. The contrast of the size of clouds and horses in *Under Heaven* reaffirms the notion of the insignificance of humans in the face of nature. *Blue Mountain* and *Believe* incorporate people into nature, showing that man and nature can coexist.

To accomplish my concept of slowing evanescence, I played with various settings of lighting, landscapes, and human poses. For example, creating elongated light trails in *Plein de Lumières* conveys wonder and spirit in a bustling city center.

Rationale

The exhibition takes place in the cafeteria, which is packed with many black panels to hang the pictures for my school's art show. Along with the panels are a few tables along the side of the room. People can enter the room from three sides, and the cafeteria's lighting is from sparse sunlight that filters in through windows and large lamps above.

From the remaining panels available, I chose one that was not heavily scratched and flanked a 2-panel exhibit of another student. I arranged my photos in two columns of three photos each, alternating panel backgrounds of black and white to achieve inclusion and balance. All the photos should be seen by the mind as a whole, hence the alternating color panels.

The exhibition panel is arranged so that there are multiple interpretations of the works based on the direction that you look. For example, looking down the left column presents a relaxed mood. In contrast, the warm colors and motion of the right column conveys a more kinetic mood.



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Selection 1: Plein de Lumières
