#### **Curatorial Rationale**

The core theme of my artwork is the massive amount of waste our society produces. Trash is never really the centerpiece of photography because no one wants to acknowledge its presence in our world. It is easier to turn a blind eye to waste once it is out of sight. However, by making trash the focus of my work, it prevents viewers from ignoring its existence. I believe that accepting the fact that each and every one of us is responsible for producing an excessive amount of waste is the first step to fixing the problem.

My work was inspired by environmental photography that shines a light on human impact. One artist in particular, Barry Rosenthal, brings attention to pollution by taking photographs of trash he collects.

All of my photographs are united under the idea that trash is a major part of our world, whether it is produced in our everyday lives, compiled in our cities, or devoted to in our landfills. I have used an array of techniques to present this idea. I manipulated the power of color to highlight trash in "Consumer," and "In sight, Out of Mind." Further, I used both landscape shots and close-ups to show the big picture, along with details I wanted to point out. I also took advantage of Photoshop to remove the head of my model in "In sight, Out of Mind" to demonstrate how trash is rarely at the forefront of anyone's mind.

The idea of personal responsibility is exemplified in my photos, "Carbon Footprint," "Consumer," and "In sight, Out of Mind." Each of these photos draws attention to waste amounted by a single entity, rather than mass waste from a society.

I also took several shots of areas dedicated to trash, such as a landfill in the mountains in "N.I.M.B.Y." I took two shots of trash piled in the residential area of a city in "Suburban Wasteland" and "Toxi-city." Within one of the city areas, I took a closer shot of CDs piles amongst trash on the ground in "Disc-arded."

#### Selection 2: Disc-arded


